Forty Years of Inventing and Reinventing CPCC

President emeritus Richard Hagemeyer 1963-1986

Visionary is a word people used to describe Dr. Richard Hagemeyer. He saw that CPCC would grow into one of the country's premier urban community colleges and then went about creating a team to build his vision. Forty years ago the community college concept was new. People wanted to know how a traditional junior college and a vocational/technical college could be forged into one.

Early on, he saw that technology was transforming instruction, that new teaching methods had to be tried. Without looking back, he focused the College's resources on improving instruction through technology. He led the College into the prestigious League for Innovation in the Community College in 1970. In 1985, researchers from the University of Texas, Harvard University, and the University of Michigan named CPCC one of the best community colleges in the nation for teaching excellence.

During his long tenure, the Central Campus grew to 33 acres with 24 buildings, and enrollment grew from 1,600 to 54,000. Many of the programs begun in the College's formative years have endured: Summer Theatre, literacy training in the community, a small business center, an emphasis on distance learning, and a vital Corporate and Continuing Education program focused on customer service and workforce development.

President Ruth Shaw 1986-1992

Anyone who watched Dr. Ruth Shaw make her entrance at CPCC and in Charlotte knew right away that she was a worthy successor to the founding president. She was a quick study who pointed the College in new directions — toward a multi-campus system and toward a more traditional approach to curriculum and administration. The College acquired land for three area campuses, and Dr. Shaw restructured the organization she inherited.

The growth in technology that began with her predecessor continued. On Central Campus two new, state-of-the-art buildings opened: the Advanced Technologies Center and the Center for Automotive Technology. In 1986 the College introduced computerized telephone registration, and in 1990 the College introduced voice mail. The Central Campus acquired a fiber optic cable backbone for the burgeoning computer network.

The community outside the College soon realized that it had also found an exceptional new leader: In 1989 she became the first woman to head up the annual United Way campaign; in 1992 she was Woman of the Year.

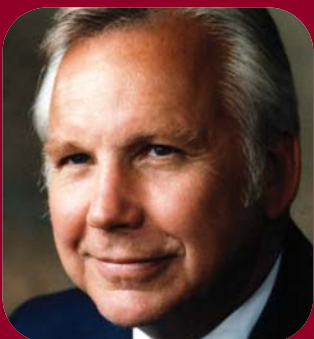
President Tony Zeiss 1992-present

Thirty years after the creation of the College, the time had come for renewal. The Board of Trustees sought a leader who could revitalize the state's largest community college. With the departure of Dr. Shaw and the impending retirement of many staff and instructors, the time was right for an energetic president with a clear vision of the future: Dr. Tony Zeiss.

He immediately set out to redefine the College's culture. By focusing on student needs and the needs of the community, he believed that the College could become a national leader in workforce development. As the new century began, the accolades and recognition came with increasing frequency. A General Accounting Office study, a Ford Foundation study, the Newcomen Society — all cited CPCC as one of the nation's preeminent community colleges. In 2002 the National Center for Educational Accountability named CPCC Community College of the Year.

A new master plan for the College projected six campuses, and all were built by 2002 with the support of Mecklenburg County voters. The College is now more accessible and affordable than ever. And all the necessary growth came at a time of budget austerity. To plug the budget gaps, the College administration sought and won grants and gifts. The CPCC Foundation and friends of the College such as Leon and Sandra Levine came through time and time again with needed resources. Along the way Dr. Zeiss was elected by his peers to be chairman of the American Association of Community Colleges.

Central Campus is now undergoing physical changes on a scale reminiscent of the 1960s and early 70s. It will be transformed to look like a traditional college campus, but on the inside it will still be as nontraditional as it was when Dr. Hagemeyer dreamed the dream.

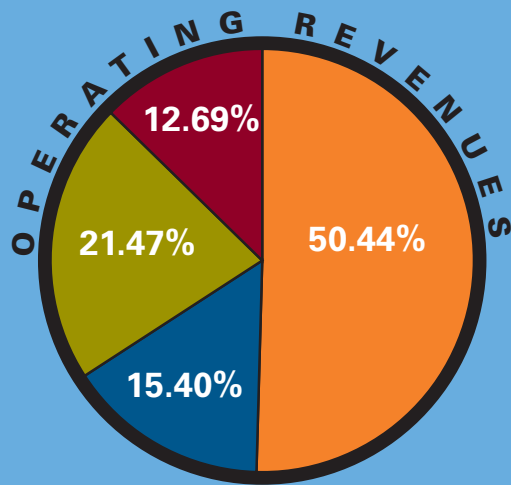

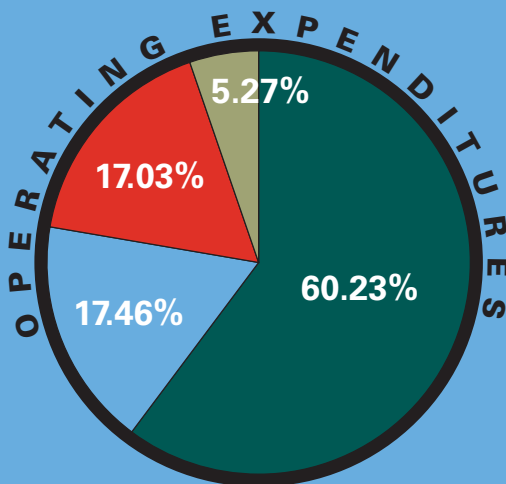

American Academy of Applied Forensics at CPCC's North Campus

In the past two years North Carolina and CPCC have received millions of federal dollars earmarked for national security and law enforcement. Representatives **Sue Myrick, Mel Watt, and Robin Hayes** and Senators **John Edwards, Jesse Helms, and Elizabeth Dole** have supported legislation to establish the American Academy of Applied Forensics (AAAF) at CPCC's North Campus.

"Currently, there are not enough forensic scientists in North Carolina, affecting our ability to carry out criminal justice proceedings," **Senator Edwards** said. "The state-of-the-art forensics academy at Central Piedmont Community College will fill a pressing need for the state and serve as a model for the rest of the nation."

AAAF Director **Calvin Jackson** also noted the need for forensics training: "Rapid advances in applied technology are revolutionizing forensic science, yet the Southeast U.S. has a shortage of skilled workers in the field. In 2000 U.S. companies spent \$118 million on computer forensics because internal security personnel lack training in prevention and detection of cybercrime."

"Forensic science is like computers — always changing. Investigative procedures must be constantly updated," said Jackson. "We believe that investigators won't do what they don't know, and so the Academy has assumed the lead in specialized training that will enhance their skill level."

The AAAF provides the southeastern U.S. with critically needed forensic training in crime scene investigation and cybercrime. Skill enhancement in the areas of identification, collection, preservation and field interpretation of evidence is a fundamental goal of the AAAF.

Under the auspices of the National Institute of Justice and the Federal Crime Laboratory Improvement Project, the academy's mission is to improve the quality of investigative services in the region through innovative training programs that link cutting edge research in the forensic sciences with the criminal justice practitioner.

The AAAF at Central Piedmont Community College will receive \$1 million in federal grants in fiscal year 2003. Of the \$1 million appropriated, \$800,000 will be used for programming and crime laboratory technology training. With the grant money, the AAAF will provide high-tech crime scene investigation tools and techniques for over 1,500 participants a year, most of whom will be law enforcement officers and investigators.

Calvin Jackson is a retired Air Force officer, former college instructor, and forensic science consultant. While in the Air Force, he served as Special Agent and Regional Forensics Consultant for the Air Force Office of Special Investigations (AFOSI) in its Pacific, Northwest, Washington and European regions. He taught at Sierra College, CA, and at CPCC, where he was selected as the first O'Herron Distinguished Faculty Member in 1998. He has lectured to over 20,000 law enforcement officers in six countries and has investigated more than a thousand crime scenes.

There is something to be said about an organization when it excels in the face of difficult challenges. To continue meeting the demands of our growth, we are launching a comprehensive campaign to raise \$15,000,000 with a very heavy focus on scholarships. The purpose of this campaign is to provide student funding on an as-needed basis whenever and wherever that need exists. We continue to miss opportunities to help students for lack of funds. As part of this effort, we have reorganized the Foundation more along the lines of a university model. Now it is part of the Department of Institutional Advancement; streamlined are functions of accountability, creating a very strong emphasis on our fund-raising efforts.

The accomplishments of this past year endorse our mission, and we thank the staff and the volunteers behind them. We also look forward to the challenges of this next year as well as the opportunities to explain our case and the opportunities in new frontiers as they unfold.

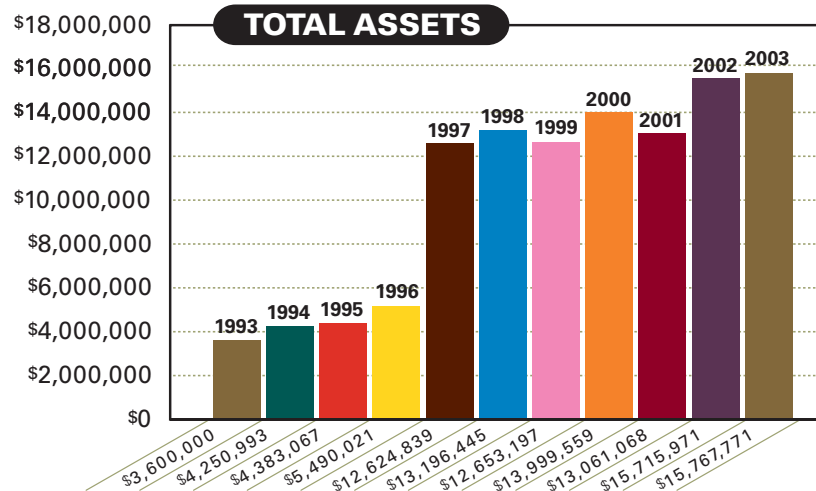
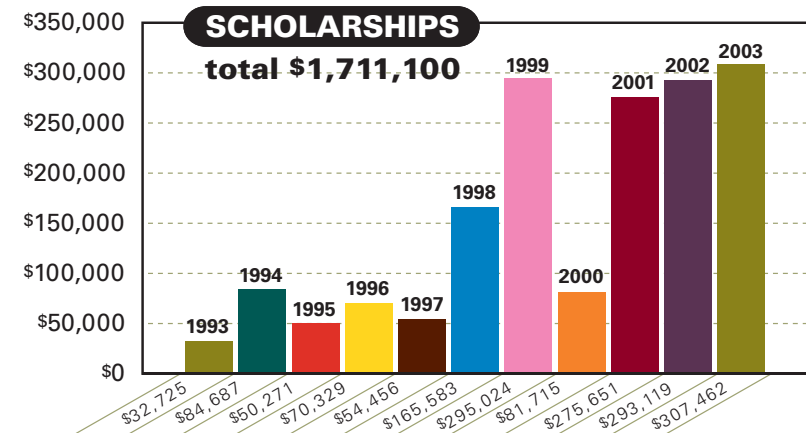
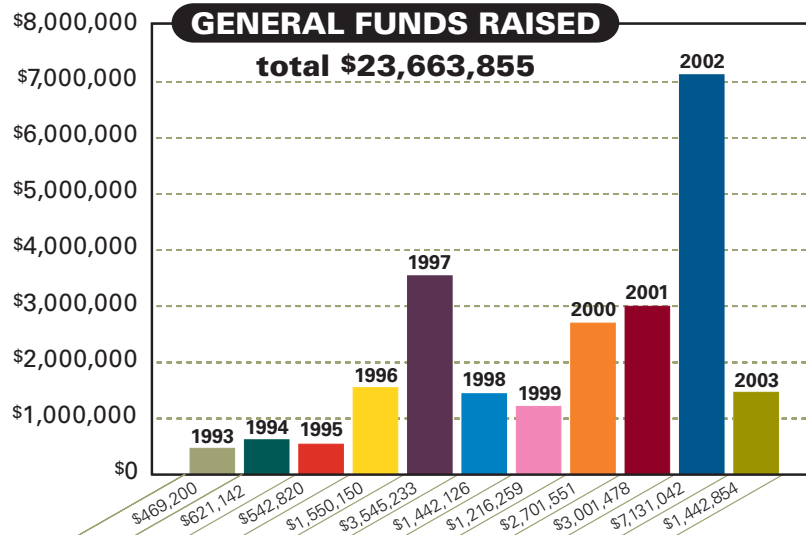

CPCC Names LEVINE CAMPUS

Education is much more accessible at CPCC thanks to a \$5,000,000 scholarship endowment established by The Leon Levine Foundation, **Sandra and Leon Levine**. We are proud to say that the College’s South Campus in Matthews is now known as the Levine Campus. The name officially changed on November 1, 2002, at a dedication ceremony attended by several hundred friends, family, business associates and College personnel. A highlight of the event was the presentation to the Levines of North Carolina’s most prestigious award, Order of the Long Leaf Pine, by **Jim Black**, Speaker of the North Carolina House of Representatives.

At the age of 12, Leon Levine and his two brothers assumed responsibility for helping their mother run their family’s small department store. Now there are more than 5,000 Family Dollar stores. *Business North Carolina* calls Mr. Levine an “iron-willed mega-merchant.” While they both may be iron willed, Leon and Sandra Levine surely have hearts of gold. Their generosity has life-changing impact at CPCC and beyond Charlotte and North Carolina.

Mr. and Mrs. Levine met with representatives from CPCC and the CPCC Foundation to learn more about how the College serves the community and to discuss the College’s greatest needs. **Dr. Tony Zeiss**, President of CPCC, shared his dream that no aspiring student in the Charlotte-Mecklenburg community be turned away from college due to a lack of funds, especially the thousands with minimal income who struggle to make ends meet but do not qualify for government assistance.

The Levines recognized that Family Dollar Stores and CPCC have much in common:

- Both make every effort to be financially and geographically accessible to customers.
- Both care about the welfare of their communities.

The Leon Levine Foundation, Sandra and Leon Levine, decided to make the largest gift in the 40-year history of the College, \$5,000,000. They have given the gift of opportunity for thousands of people to improve themselves through education at CPCC.

Central High Legacy

CPCC Foundation hosted a Central High Reunion on October 5, 2002. Some 1,335 alumni of Central High attended. They came from all over – Texas, Florida, Virginia, and the Carolinas to name a few states. The reunion was for those who attended Central High from 1923 through 1959.

Jim Beatty ('53) and **Patsy Kinsey** ('59) chaired the reunion efforts. Old Central High on Elizabeth Avenue, the oldest building on Central Piedmont's campus, reclaimed its original name. The building continues to be used for CPCC classes, counseling, student registration, and other services.

But alums did not stop here. They started a Central High Legacy Fund to provide scholarship assistance to CPCC students with need. As of June 30, \$165,381.63 was raised. Gifts are still coming. Certain gift levels entitle donors to name either scholarships or Central High rooms. Donors will be recognized in a permanent way at a park to be built across from Central High on Elizabeth Avenue.

Their gifts will live forever in the lives of CPCC students.

CPCC names SOMMERS Building

An administrative building which serves as headquarters for the CPCC Department of Institutional Advancement/ and College Foundation, Community Relations and Marketing Services, Equal Opportunity and Adult Community Outreach, Planning and Research, and Resource Development was named in June for one of the College's most prominent and generous benefactors – **James B. Sommers**, retired president of private banking for Bank of America.

Jim Sommers served as president of the CPCC Foundation Board of Directors for 11 years. He served as a member of the Board for 17 years. In 1995, he chaired the College's "Winning Partnerships" Capital Campaign, raising \$6,646,843 for current program needs. He shepherded the Foundation from a part-time operation to national prominence, increasing funds raised by 1,313 percent during his tenure.

Amidst a gathering of civic and community leaders, the dedication ceremony included the presentation of a plaque to be hung in the Sommers Building, recognizing his support of the College and Foundation and his commitment to education in Charlotte-Mecklenburg.

Jim expressed his feelings by stating, "Although my long suit is not known to be humility, I am truly humbled by this honor because of the extraordinary importance that Central Piedmont Community College is to this community. I remain committed to its mission and its goals because CPCC is the people's opportunity ... in addition, it's affordable, it's convenient, and it provides excellent education and training."

Jim Sommers is married to Jan; they have three adult children.

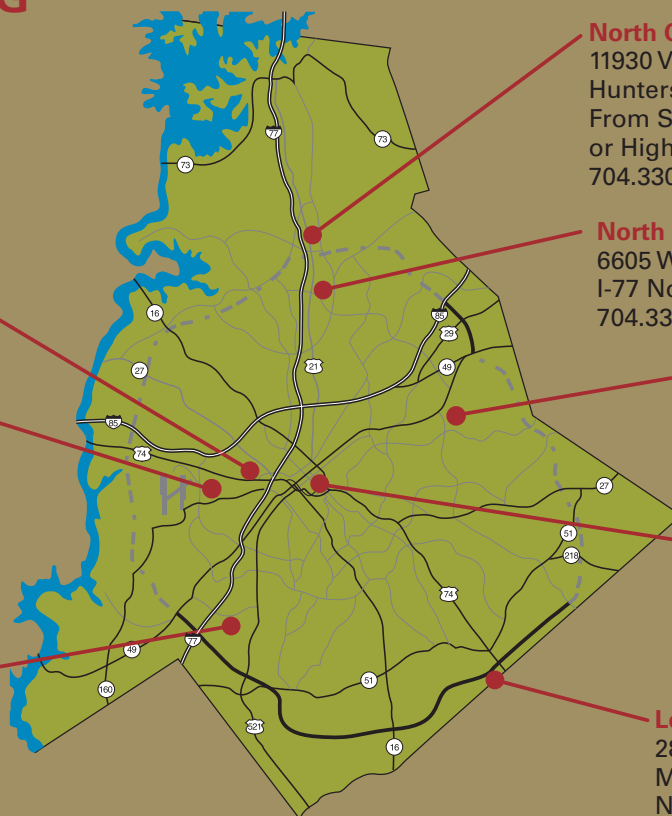
