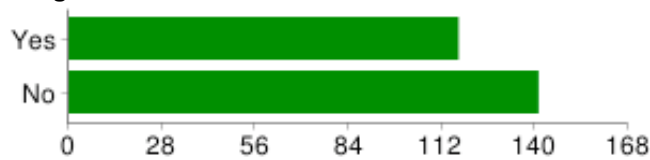

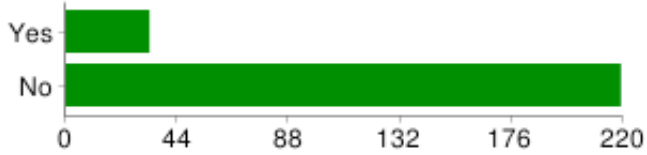

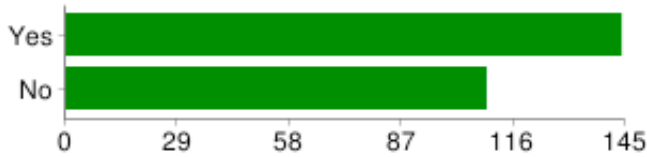

dfgh dfg bfg Related Issue: Some advisors recommend that students ask instructors for a W grade at the end of the semester when the earned grade is a D or F. As a consequence, students believe they can simply get their grade changed to a W if they are dissatisfied with their grade, rendering the withdrawal date meaningless to them. I have asked my students and they said that most of their classes had not even had one test by the 35% date. Even with one test, it isn't a good representation of how they will do in the class. Before the 35% date, I had 43 students who failed their first test. ...
